Starting with just one medicine cabinet and a vision, they founded this organization, which today, stands proud, having a Voluntary Blood Bank, which has been operating efficiently and around 250 registered patients in Thalassemia Daycare Centre. Throughout the decades, PWA has catered to the needs, not just the patients of Dr. Ruth K.M. Pfau Civil Hospital Karachi, but all over Karachi. Here at PWA, we believe that every human life is precious, and we shall do everything in our power to aid those in need.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES

A feather in the institution's cap; PWA's very own voluntary blood bank has held the torch of being the largest single outlet blood bank in Pakistan ever since its inception in 1982. Registered with the Sindh Blood Transfusion Authority, our blood bank maintains an average daily output of 250 blood bags, completely free of cost. To ensure complete safety and integrity of donated blood, each bag, in full compliance with WHO guidelines, undergoes a rigorous screening process, which includes mandatory testing of HIV, Malaria, Syphilis, Hepatitis B and C. Upgraded methodology of Chemo Luminescence Immunosorbent Assay (CLIA) is being used in making every blood bag dispatched safer than ever.

THALASSEMIA SERVICES

Recognizing the ever-growing necessity of thalassemia-targeted management, PWA took a trail-blazing initiative by upgrading its 'Thalassemia Follow-up Clinic' to an independent department, encompassing the 'Thalassemia Daycare Centre' in 2011. It incorporates the services of:

- Regular and screened blood transfusions
- Iron chelation therapy and other supporting medications
- Viral markers, screening, and other baseline investigations; all under the supervision and guidance of a competent he-

matologist, completely free of cost.

Besides, PWA's directive is not just limited to managing thalassemia but also to spread awareness about such a prevalent condition, via regular awareness campaigns, addressing the root causes and stigma attached to the disease.



SPONSOR A THALASSEMIC (SAT) - LEND A SMILE

Suffering from health issues is never easy but whenever a patient with some chronic illness belongs to a family with insufficient financial resources, the suffering adds up and a million of Pakistan's population is so, struggling with the deadly disease of thalassemia. An ailment which, without medication and treatment has no chances of even few breaths for the patient. A disease which makes them depend totally on our support to the survivors.

PWA, for these innocent children, is managing around 250 such patients at PWA-Thalassemia Daycare Centre Civil Hospital Karachi by providing them regularly with screened blood, iron chelation therapy, laboratory tests, and supporting medications under the supervision of competent doctors, entirely free of cost, all by your help. Each patient's total expense estimates around 300,000-500,000 rupees per year, hence PWA launched its "Sponsor A Thalassemic" campaign. In this SAT Campaign we invite generous people from every walk of life so that together we make a difference for these thalassemia warriors of today and step up for a Healthy Pakistan tomorrow.

PWA never compromises on the quality of facilities provided to the thalassemia patients registered at

at the centre and earnestly appeals to the philanthropic donors to come forward, be a part of this campaign and sponsor the expenses of at least one thalassemia patient through their zakat and donations as small participation can bring about big differences.

STRIVING WITH THALASSEMIA

Thalassemia, being the most common genetic blood disorder in Asia, can be described as a disorder inherited from parents resulting in the progeny having low levels of hemoglobin. This lack of hemoglobin affects the oxygen-carrying capacity of the blood. Thalassemia is diagnosed via Hemoglobin Electrophoresis. This disease is broadly divided into two types: Alpha and Beta, with Beta-Thalassemia being the predominant type in Pakistan. The beta type is further classified into minor and major beta-thalassemia. Around 6% of Pakistan's population is affected by the former whereas estimates state that 9.8 million people suffer from the latter with this number increasing by 5000-7000 patients every year. Managing strategies for this disease available includes blood transfusions and iron chelation therapy. The only available treatment for Thalassemia is Bone Marrow Transplant, which is a very expensive and difficult procedure. Prevention of Thalassemia has been met with big hurdles such as the apparent lack of awareness of the role of consanguineous marriages, along with a reluctance to undergo premarital, antenatal screening, or genetic screening that result from a lack of well-informed public education and long-standing social stigma. To combat such a situation, there is the research-proven initiative of community health education and outreach programs in combination with the development of a comprehensive prevention program that includes premarital counselling, genetic analysis and antenatal screening.

COUNSELING SESSION FOR THE PARENTS OF THALASSEMIC WARRIORS

On September 24th, 2020, PWA arranged a counselling session for the parents of our registered thalassemic patients. Dr. Saud, a well-known consultant, and motivational speaker conducted a brief session with our thalassemic warriors' parents. Interacting with the parents, he highlighted the struggles of achieving true happiness and how to overcome the thoughts of negativity, depression, and anxiety in these times. A tour of our departments was given to the guests. Some fun and exciting activities were also conducted with our thalassemic warriors. We appreciate and thank Dr. Saud and his team wholeheartedly for taking out their valuable time for us and sharing his wisdom.



SEMINAR ON "THALASSEMIA AND BLOOD BANKING CHALLENGES"

In collaboration with Dr. Farhan Essa and the Committee of Thalassemia, PWA arranged a seminar, "Thalassemia and Blood Banking Challenges" on 30th September 2020. The seminar featured the importance of Thalassemia Awareness in our society. The main speakers were Dr. Farhan Essa and Dr. Farhan Ahmed. PWA Volunteer gave a brief presentation to the audience about the working of PWA and the challenges that we faced during this pandemic situation and how we coped up with that. PWA's documentary was also played during the event.

BLOOD DONATION

A DIRE NEED

Even though blood can safely be donated every 16 weeks by all healthy individuals aged 18 – 65 years, only 10% of blood available in blood banks comes from voluntary blood donors, despairingly mounting its shortage to reach up to 40% by 2018. This severe blood crisis in our homeland can be overcome if merely 1% of our population starts donating blood voluntarily and regularly, thinking of their fellow citizens whose lives depend on these bags of our blood.

For these very vulnerable people who worry about their next transfusion, PWA has been a ray of hope since 1979. Besides the blood donation camps that are set up numerous times throughout the year at various places around the city, PWA also launched the "mobile camps" facility, owing to the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent lockdown. With the SOPs in place and the ever-high morale of our generous donors and volunteers, PWA was able to collect more than 1100 bleeds from 22 locations across Karachi Alhamdulillahl


SHARE HOPE CAMPAIGN

STEPS TAKEN FOR BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES &

VOLUNTARY BLOOD BANK

The examples of those who went through hardships in this phase are immense. PWA also went through a massively trying ordeal. Blood was severely short, and it affected the poor patients, whom PWA offers its assistance to. Blood camps were arranged in order to replenish the depleted blood stocks on different locations Keeping the situation in mind, proper SOPs were followed according to the guidelines issued by the major health authorities. A strict screening process was followed to ensure no person with symptoms was accidentally donating blood to avoid the spread of the virus. PPEs were provided to all the staff, working in our blood bank, so that they do not acquire or transmit the virus.



THALASSEMIA DAYCARE CENTRE

Steps also had to be taken for PWA's other distinguishing service, the Thalassemia Daycare Center, which offers its services to around 250 registered thalassemia patients. Considering the danger of this disease, as well as the fact that it requires regular blood transfusions and continual check-ups, the importance of running it during the pandemic becomes clear since it is not something that can be paused.

Safety measures had to be taken by the staff and patients in order to reduce the risk of getting the virus. Masks and sanitizers were distributed to everyone involved, while maintaining a safe level of social distance. Guidance and counseling were offered to each patient on an individual level on this new virus and how to make oneself as safe as possible from getting it.

STILL A SOCIAL STIGMA?

LIVE SESSION ON ACCOUNT OF WORLD SUICIDE PREVENTION DAY

On the occasion of World Suicide Prevention Day, pWA, in their live session, managed to get on board Dr Shahnawaz Meer, PWA alumnus, a child, adolescent and adult psychiatrist and a diplomat at the American board of psychiatry and neurology. During the interview, topics like bipolar disorder, Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), anxiety and especially suicide were thoroughly discussed. They are busy in spreading smiles on faces which were tensed before, tired in making their spaces


