No one can do everything but everyone can do something.



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#### AN INSIGHT INTO PWA

"No act of kindness, no matter how small, is ever wasted."

Our little deeds of kindness can make a big difference in someone's life and when they are done selflessly, we are rewarded with the unimaginable. Here at PWA, students of Dow Medical College have been working dedicatedly, ever since its establishment in 1979, to improve the lives of the patients of Civil Hospital Karachi and beyond. PWA is the largest student run, non-profitable, non-political welfare organization situated in Civil Hospital Karachi and run entirely by the students of Dow Medical College. What started thirty-eight years ago from a single cabinet of medicines has now grown into a multi-departmental organization which provides the following services to the patients of Civil Hospital Karachi.

#### **BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES:**

It has been almost thirty-five years since the Blood Bank was established in 1982. It is registered by the Sindh Blood Transfusion Authority(SBTA). It is a source of more than 280 blood bags providing packed cells, fresh frozen plasma and mega units of platelets on daily exchange basis completely free of cost. PWA ensures provision of disease free blood through its most advanced blood screening CLIA technology which screens the blood for major infections like HIV, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, Syphilis and Malaria to ensure the health of all recipients.

#### **DRUG BANK:**

The Drug bank, which formed the foundation of PWA, was established in 1979. It started as a single cabinet of medicines and has now expanded to a full-fledged functioning pharmacy. Our drug bank holds all the necessary medications, expensive injections and caters to the requests of the admitted patients of CHK as well as to patients of thalassemia registered by PWA.

#### THALASSEMIA SERVICES:

Thalassemia is a lifelong, hereditary blood disease. The only treatment for which is blood transfusion followed by a therapy called iron chelation therapy. PWA provides blood transfusions and medications on a regular basis along with regular follow-ups to the registered patients. The department of Thalassemia Services was established in May 2011. We are currently providing patients with complete medical treatment under the guidance of a qualified hematologist, free of cost.

#### PWA-A SHARIAH-COMPLIANT ORGANIZATION

#### "Charity does not in any way decrease the wealth."

We would like to bring into your knowledge that Alhumdulillah, PWA is now managing its finances through a Shariah-compliant system under the guidance of Dar-ul-Ifta, Jamia Darululoom, Karachi.

PWA follows the 'wakala' model of Zakat where the patients, upon receiving free treatment and services, nominate PWA as a 'wakil' (agent) and authorize the organization to receive Zakat on behalf of these patients, to be spent on other expenses endorsed as 'zakat deserving' by the Shariah advisor.

Treatment at PWA is 100% free of cost for all patients. The organization's expenses however are required to go through the Shariah Advisor who helps gauge if the zakat pool could be used for an operational expense or not. If they are, then the specific expense is funded from the Zakat pool, else through the 'Donation' pool. Moreover, we have well defined Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) governing our Zakat utilization and these clearly delineate the list of applicable expenses.

There are separate accounts for Zakat and Donations in Meezan Bank.

Donors must specify which pool they want to donate to.

The purpose of this is to ensure that Zakat money is spent only on the treatment of 'mustaheq' patients.

Give your Zakat to PWA and help save lives.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

It is with infinite pleasure and humble gratitude to Allah (SWT) that I present the audited financial statements of the year 2016-17 for Patients' Welfare Association.

Generations of volunteers have passed through the gates of this organization and found within themselves the spirit of selfless giving. We have tried to continue this altruistic work with the same will and enthusiasm of our seniors and in doing so have achieved a sense of true gratification while spreading hope and happiness amongst the ailing masses of Karachi.

### PATIENTS' WELFARE ASSOCIATION (DOW MEDICAL COLLEGE & CIVIL HOSPITAL) NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

#### i STATUS

Patients' Welfare Association (the Association) is a Social Welfare Organization carrying out welfare activities at Civil Hospital, Karachi. The Association was established in the year 1979. It is registered under Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (registration and Control) Ordinance, 1961 with Director of Social Welfare Govt. of Sindh vide Reg. DSW(S)/399 of 1981 dated 31 December 1981.

#### 2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 2.1 Accounting system and convention

The management of association has decided to adopt accrual basis of accounting for preparation of financial statements with effect from the year ended 30 June 2003.

These accounts have been prepared under historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies herein below.

#### 2.2 Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of primary economic environment in which the Association operates. The financial statements are presented in Pak Rupees, which is the Association's functional and presentation currency.

#### 2.3 Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Pak Rupees using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Exchange gains and losses are recognised in the income and expenditure account.

#### 2.4 Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are stated at written down value. Depreciation charge is based on the reducing balance method at the rates specified in note 3 to the financial statements. Depreciation on additions is charged from the month the asset is put into use, while on disposals, depreciation is charged up to the month the asset was in use.

Normal repairs and maintenance are charged to income as and when incurred. Major renewals and replacements are capitalized and the assets so replaced, if any, are retired.

Gains or losses on sale of fixed assets are included in income currently.

#### 2.5 Stock

Stock held (including stock in transit) is valued at cost.

Donation in kinds are recorded at their fair value at the date of donation.

#### 2.6 Revenue recognition

Donations & Grants either in cash or in kind are recorded on receipts basis. All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

#### 2.7 Capitalization of reserve for capital expenditure

Donation for capital expenditure received for a particular fixed asset is recognized as Income when said asset is available for use .

#### 2.8 Funds

#### Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds represents resources over which the association has discretionary control and are available for the various programs and administration of the association.

#### Restricted funds

Restricted funds represents resources subject to donor imposed restrictions.

Any surplus remaining in restricted funds is transferred to unrestricted funds, if permitted by the donors or agreement between the association and the donor(s).

#### **BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES**

Over the years, the department of Blood Transfusion Services has proved to be one of the fundamental and constitutive services provided voluntarily by PWA. PWA Voluntary Blood Bank which is registered by the Sindh Blood Transfusion Authority (SBTA) has been catering up to more than 250 requests per day throughout the city, ensuring that blood is provided to the patients on exchange basis, free of cost.

It has become the largest single outlet blood bank providing blood components that include packed cells, platelets, fresh frozen plasma and mega units of platelets. Before dispatching, each blood bag is screened using Chemiluminescent Immunosorbent Assay (CLIA) making every bag safe to dispatch. Every pint of blood goes through a cautious process of screening for HIV, Hepatitis B and C, Malaria and Syphilis in correspondence with WHO guidelines.

PWA has always aspired for the provision of quality and disease-free blood to the needy and has strived for this cause in every way possible. PWA volunteers also try to spread awareness regarding voluntary blood donations. For this purpose, voluntary blood camps and various awareness sessions are conducted throughout the year at various colleges, universities and organizations.

PWA is grateful for the donations of its well-wishers, both blood and monetary. We would have never been able to attain such landmarks if it had not been for your immeasurable support.

#### DIAGNOSTIC LABORATORY

Patients' Welfare Association has always aimed to provide the needed facilities to the underprivileged patients of Civil Hospital Karachi. In order to do this, PWA established its Diagnostic Laboratory in 1986 to provide basic biochemical and hematological investigations free of cost. Since 2011, laboratory services have been gradually discontinued due to the establishment of the Central Laboratory in Civil Hospital. By June 2017 all laboratory services to CHK were discontinued since the central lab is sufficient and fulfilling people's needs. The Diagnostic Lab now provides Complete Blood Count (CBC) with peripheral film study to our thalassemia patients only. This has enabled us to channel our funds into improvement of other departments.

To sustain our current services and to achieve future goals, we look forward to the support of our hospitable donors, who have helped save lives and provide health facilities to the destitute patients.

#### THALASSEMIA SERVICES

PWA expanded its services in 2011 by establishing the Thalassemia Day Care Centre. The department aims to provide treatment to the patients suffering from thalassemia, a genetic disorder that requires regular blood transfusions and medicines for survival.

Our TDC Centre serves around 260 registered patients. The services include regular transfusions of safe & screened blood, iron chelating agents, other medicines, lab investigations and consultation by a qualified Hematologist. The average cost required for providing these services without paucity ranges between 200,000 - 4,00,000 per patient per annum.

To meet the need of finances, we run a year round campaign, "Sponsor a Thalassemic" to support the monetary requirements of these patients. With SAT campaign, we have met great donors. We would like to express immense gratitude to our generous donors, philanthropists and well-wishers for their continuous support. ### FOLLOW-UP CLINICS

"Healing yourself relates to healing others." Putting this in consideration, PWA started a war against chronic illnesses like Diabetes, Hypertension, Ulcers, Tumors, Syphilis, Tuberculosis, etc. In 2003 with the aim of minimizing the suffering, PWA set up the 'Follow-Up Clinics'. The purpose of this department was to provide medications to the registered patients. Following are the sub-departments of Follow-Up Clinics:

T.B FOLLOW-UP CLINIC: Tuberculosis was one of the most prevalent infectious disease in Pakistan in 1984. Keeping in mind the burden of Tuberculosis, PWA started its efforts against Tuberculosis by setting up a Tuberculosis follow-up clinic and this clinic became the ray of hope for T.B patients. The clinic was being operated under the supervision of a well-qualified Medical Officer. The goal of this clinic was to provide the patients with all necessary Antituberculous drugs and relevant laboratory and imaging tests such as X-Rays free of cost. In 2014, the Government of Pakistan took the initiative to fight Tuberculosis by inaugurating a T.B Clinic in Civil Hospital Karachi which provided all the necessary medications and tests to the patients free of cost. Hence in 2017, the government clinic was full-fledged operational so PWA decided to close its contemporary T.B Follow-up Clinic.

GENERAL FOLLOW-UP: With the support of our generous donors, PWA initiated its battle against a broad spectrum of chronic diseases. It was an uphill task to provide all the necessary medications to 83 registered patients with PWA but with the grace of Almighty God, PWA managed to do so until 2017 when the Administration of Civil Hospital Karachi started to provide all the prescribed drugs to the patients on their respective follow-up visits from the Civil Hospital Pharmacy.

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
