


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Treasurer's Report

By the grace of Almighty Allah (SWT), Patients' Welfare Association here presents the audited reports for the fiscal year 2017-18.


Over a period of four decades, PWA has grown to become an organization with annual expenses amounting to 95 million Rupees(PKR).


DEPARTMENT EXPENDITURE 2018 VS 2017




departments have been established; the 'Human Resource Department' and the 'Resource Generation Department'. These departments have caused a marked rise in our salary expenses.

Opinion

PATIENTS' WELFARE ASSOCIATION (DOW MEDICAL COLLEGE & CIVIL HOSPITAL) NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2018

1 STATUS AND NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Patients' Welfare Association (the Association) is a Social Welfare Organization carrying out welfare activities at Civil Hospital, Karachi. The Association was established in the year 1979. It is registered under Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (registration and Control) Ordinance, 1961 with Director of Social Welfare Govt. of Sindh vide Reg. DSW(S)/399 of 1981 dated 31 December 1981.

2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Accounting system and convention

The management of association has decided to adopt accrual basis of accounting for preparation of financial statements with effect from the year ended 30 June 2003.

These accounts have been prepared under historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies herein below.

2.2 Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of primary economic environment in which the Association operates. The financial statements are presented in Pak Rupees, which is the Association's functional and presentation currency.

2.3 Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Pak Rupees using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Exchange gains and losses are recognised in the income and expenditure account.

2.4 Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are stated at written down value. Depreciation charge is based on the reducing balance method at the rates specified in note 3 to the financial statements. Depreciation on additions is charged from the month the asset is put into use, while on disposals, depreciation is charged up to the month the asset was in use.

Normal repairs and maintenance are charged to income as and when incurred. Major renewals and replacements are capitalized and the assets so replaced, if any, are retired.

Gains or losses on sale of fixed assets are included in income currently.

2.5 Stock

Stock held (including stock in transit) is valued at cost.

Donation in kinds are recorded at their fair value at the date of donation.

2.6 Revenue recognition

Donations & Grants either in cash or in kind are recorded on receipts basis. All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

PWA-AN INSIGHT

Nothing brings more happiness than being able to help the less-privileged people in the society. This is the aim of the organization known as Patients' Welfare Association which was founded by the students of Dow Medical College Karachi back in 1979. The main purpose of this association is to facilitate the patients of Civil Hospital Karachi and beyond. PWA is situated in Civil Hospital Karachi and for the past forty years it has been run entirely by the students of Dow Medical College. It provides the following services to the patients of Ruth Pfau Civil Hospital, Karachi.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES:

The Blood Bank was established in 1982 and it is registered by the Sindh Blood Transfusion Authority (SBTA). More than 280 units of packed cells, fresh frozen plasma and mega units of platelets are dispatched daily on exchange basis or free of cost. PWA ensures provision of disease free blood through its advanced screening technology CLIA, which screens the blood for HIV, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, Syphilis and Malaria to ensure the health of all recipients.

THALASSEMIA SERVICES:

Thalassemia is a blood disorder which a child can inherit from his parents. Children who have this disease need medicines as well as blood transfusions on a regular basis. The department of Thalassemia services was established in May 2011 and it provides screened blood as well as required medications to more than 250 patients, under the supervision of a qualified hematologist completely free of cost.

It is because of the endless support of well-wishers that we have come this far. We hope to achieve greater heights and be able to help even more people than before in the coming years.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES

Over 40 years of its legacy, the department of Blood Transfusion Services has proved to be one of the integral and elemental services provided by PWA on volunteer basis. PWA Voluntary Blood Bank is registered by the Sindh Blood Transfusion Authority (SBTA), and has been catering to more than 280 requests per day throughout the city, ensuring provision of safe blood to the patients on exchange basis and from voluntary blood donation, completely FREE OF COST.

From its inception, it has become the largest single outlet blood bank providing component therapy. This is done in three forms namely, packed cells, platelets and fresh frozen plasma. Before dispatching, each blood bag is screened by Chemiluminescent Immunoassay (CLIA) making every single bag safe to dispatch. In this methodology, every pint of blood goes through a vigilant process of screening for HIV l and HIV ll, Hepatitis B and C, Malaria and Syphilis in correspondence with the WHO guidelines.

PWA has always aspired for the provision of high quality and disease-free blood to the needy and has strived for this cause in every way possible. PWA volunteers try to spread awareness about voluntary blood donations. For this purpose, voluntary blood camps and awareness sessions are conducted throughout the year at various colleges, universities and institutions.

PWA is highly thankful for all your benefaction in the form of donations, both blood and monetary. We would have never been able to attain such landmarks if it had not been for your immeasurable support.

THALASSEMIA REPORT

The department of Thalassemia Services emerged as a ray of hope for many parents who had to watch their children die from Thalassemia, an inherited disorder of the blood. PWA Thalassemia Day Care Center was inaugurated in 2011 as a "Public Private Partnership" between PWA and Government of Sindh.

In a short period of time, TDC became one of the major departments of PWA, currently serving around 260 registered patients. Regular blood transfusions along with Iron Chelation Therapy and laboratory investigations are provided completely free of cost under the supervision of qualified consultant hematologist, medical officer and trained nurses.

PWA Thalassemia Services runs a year-round SAT (Sponsor A Thalassemic) Campaign in which our donors come forward to hold the hand of a thalassemia patient and bear the cost of their treatment. The sponsorship costs around Rs.3,00,000 - 5,00,000 per patient annually.

We request that our donors, helpers and well-wishers continue to support us in the future also. May Allah help us and ease our path in serving the suffering humanity.

MESSAGE

At the time of its inception, 40 years, PWA seemed like another brave effort with bleak chances of survival. But with the passage of time, PWA has flourished day by day, year by year, from a couple of cupboards full of drugs to a vastly renowned of highly reputed association helping needy and poor patients attending corridors of Civil Hospital, Karachi. All these have been possible because of dedicated volunteers' medical students of Dow Medical College. More impressive is the fact that each year more ambitious new students come forward to volunteer, bringing with them new ideas, destined to take PWA to ever more greater heights. Presently with the ever-increasing demand of medical studies, semester system, research and timely attendance, the students are finding hard to spare time for volunteer work. After graduation and becoming doctors, PWA workers have imbibed a sense of responsibility to help others and become lifelong volunteers in social charitable work.

It is heartening to note that some of the services provided by the PWA in the past, have been adequately taken over by the hospital authorities and are no longer required. The Drug Bank established in 1979, catering to the patients admitted in CHK has recently been closed down, as the hospital authorities are providing the drugs to the patients admitted in the ward. The TB follow up clinic has also been discontinued, as TB patients are now better looked after at CHK. Hopefully the authorities will further improve the services provided to the patients and PWA students volunteers will continue to contribute their share for the needy and poor patients of CHK.

The good tiding this year is establishment of PWA Alumni on 30th December 2018. The President elected is Dr. Abdul Rehman , no other person then one of the three founding members of PWA 40 years ago. PWA, inshaAllah, will continue to play and expand its services in contributing to look after less privileged members of the society.
