### AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2023

Dear sir:

We are pleased to enclose herewith two copies of draft financial statements of Patients' Welfare Association (the Association) for the year ended June 30, 2023 together with our draft audit report thereon duly initialled by us for identification purposes. We shall be pleased to sign our audit report in its present or amended form after the financial statements have been approved by the Association and signed on their behalf by the Patron and President, upon receipt of the following:

- 1. Letter of representation signed by Patron and President on behalf of the Association as per draft provided by us.
- 2. Approval in respect of the following:
  - Additions to operating fixed assets amounting to Rs. 39.175 million.
  - Donations received during the year amounting to Rs. 155.469 million.
  - Government grant received during the year amounting to Rs. 99.252 million.
- 3. Confirmation about tax related matters from tax consultant is still pending.

We would like to advise you that unless we sign our report, these draft financial statements shall remain and be deemed un-audited.

Below are the matters which we would like to bring into attention of Patron and President of the Association:

1. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MANAGEMENT AND AUDITORS IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The responsibilities of the independent auditors in a usual examination of financial statements are stipulated in International Standards on Auditing. While the auditors are responsible for forming and expressing their opinion on the financial statements, the responsibility for preparation of such statements is primarily that of the Association's management.



The management's responsibilities include the maintenance of adequate accounting records and internal controls, the selection and application of accounting policies, safeguarding of the assets of the Association and prevention and detection of fraud and irregularities. The audit of financial statements does not relieve the management of its responsibilities.

### 2. WEAKNESS IN INTERNAL CONTROLS / POINTS FOR IMPROVEMENTS

- 2.1 We have observed that the Association does not have an internal audit department. Internal audit function is an independent and objective assurance and controlling activity, designed to add value and improve the Association's operations. We recommend that there should be an internal audit department to carry out checks regularly to ensure that the systems as designed and implemented are being rigidly followed and the procedures are standardized. The internal audit department should also ensure that the assets of the Association are properly safeguarded all the time.
- As the Association deals in cash and bank receipts in terms of donations and zakat, we highlight management to develop a system to monitor cash receipt and unidentified fund transfers in the bank account, in order to avoid any non-compliance with respect to Anti Money Laundering Act, 2010.
- 2.3 We have observed that the Association is not maintaining a proper fixed asset register. Moreover, they are charging depreciation on the basis WDV at an identical rate i.e. 10% for all of its assets. New assets purchased are capitalized at cost and depreciated over the life of the assets. We recommend to management to conduct an exercise for developing an item wise fixed asset register, which includes date of purchase or grant. Furthermore, there's no formal written and authorized policy agreement regarding fixed asset depreciation. Formal policy manual should be established for the purpose of recognition of depreciation on fixed asset.

#### 3 CASH AND BANK BALANCES

We have observed that the Association has excess cash and bank balances is available in comparison to its monthly utilization, we recommend the management to develop a policy relating to investment of excess funds duly approved by the Patron and President, so that investment income is generated. Also the additional funds generated from such investments can be utilize by management to enhance operational activities of the Association.



#### 4 PROVISION FOR TAXATION

As per management, the Association claims tax credit equal to one hundred per cent of the tax payable under section 100C of Income Tax Ordinance, 2001, including minimum tax and final taxes payable. Therefore, no provision for taxation has been recorded in these financial statements for current year. Kindly confirm this in in order.

#### 5 CONTINGENCIES AND COMMITMENTS

We have been informed by the management that there are no contingencies and commitments at the reporting date other than those disclosed in the financial statements.

#### 6 FRAUDS AND ERRORS

We have been informed by the management of the Association that to the best of their knowledge there have been no instances of frauds or irregularities during the reporting period that could have a material effect on the financial statements of the Association.

#### 7 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

We have been informed by the management that there were no transactions with the related parties other than those disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 8 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

We have informed by management that there were no subsequent events having an impact on amounts and or disclosures except as disclose in the financial statements.

We take this opportunity to thank your staff and management for the courtesy and cooperation extended to us during the course of our audit.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNING BODY

#### Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Patients' Welfare Association ("the Association") which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2023 and the statement funds for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of **Patients' Welfare Association** as at June 30, 2023, and of its financial performance, its surplus and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (the Code), and we have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide basis for our opinion.

### Responsibilities of Management and Those charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

The management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan, and for such internal control as the management determine necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Associations' financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.



As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Associations to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

### PATIENTS' WELFARE ASSOCIATION NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2023

### 1. NATURE AND STATUS OF OPERATIONS

Patients' Welfare Association (the Association) is a Social Welfare Organization carrying out welfare activities at Civil Hospital, Karachi. The Association was established in the year 1979. It is registered under Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (registration and Control) Ordinance, 1961 with Director of Social Welfare Affairs, Government of Sindh vide Reg. DSW(S)/399 of 1981 dated December 31, 1981.

#### 2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

#### 2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan. The accounting standards comprise of International Financial Reporting Standards for Medium-Sized Entities (IFRS for SMEs) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) and Accounting Standard for Not for Profit Organizations (NPOs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP).

#### 2.2 Basis of measurement

These financial statements have been prepared under historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies herein below.

#### 2.3 Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Pakistani rupees ('Rupees' or 'Rs'), which is the Association's functional and presentation currency.

### 3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies applied in the presentation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied for the year presented, unless otherwise stated.

### 3.1 Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are stated at written down value. Depreciation charge is based on the reducing balance method at the rates specified in note 4 to the financial statements. Depreciation on additions is charged from the month the asset is put into use, whereas depreciation is charged upto months in which asset is disposed off, in the year of disposal. The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed periodically and adjusted if it impacts on depreciation.

Maintenance and normal repairs are charged to the statement of income and expenditure as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalized and the assets so replaced, if any, are retired.

Gain and loss on disposal of property plant and equipment is accounted for in the statement of income and expenditure currently.

#### 3.2 Intangible asset

Intangibles are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses, if any. Amortisation is charged on the reducing balance method as the rates specified in notes 5 of the financial statements.

Amortisation is charged to the statement of income and expenditure by applying the reducing balance method at the rates specified in relevant note.

Costs associated with maintenance of intangible assets are charged to income and expenditure account in the year in which they are incurred.

#### 3.3 Stock in hand

Stock in hand includes reagent and allied, antiseras, medicines, injections and screening reagents. Stock in hand is valued at cost and recorded using first-in first-out method.

#### 3.3 Donation in kind

Donation in kinds are recorded at their fair value at the date of receipt in the relevant head of account, depending upon the nature of item received.

### 3.4 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purposes of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents consists of cash in hand and balances with banks net of borrowings not considered to be in the nature of financing activities.

#### 3.5 Revenue recognition

Donations & grants either in cash or in kind are recorded on receipts basis. All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

#### 3.6 Fund account

#### a) Endownment fund

The Association has created endowment fund, in order to support financial difficulty, that may arise due to lack of adequate donations and zakat receipts in future financial years. These funds are governend These Funds are governed by the rules approved by the Patron. The contributions to the Funds include transfers by the Association from its surplus as well as amounts received in lieu of Grants.

#### b) General Fund

Any excess of income over expenditure which is not transferred to endowment fund is taken to the General Fund.

#### 3.7 Taxation

The association claims tax credit equal to one hundred per cent of the tax payable under section 100C of Income Tax Ordinance, 2001, including minimum tax and final taxes payable. Therefore, no provision for taxation has been recorded in these financial statements for current year.

#### 3.8 Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Pakistani Rupees using the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the reporting date. Exchange gains and losses are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure.
